Academic Needs	As an alternative charter, our school differentiates learning for all students with a variety of instructional modes to accommodate all students. There is extended day tutoring and independent study time as needed for every student.			
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	Our school is collaborating with Arizona Youth Partnerships to provide daily instruction on SEL topics as well as counsel/guide students who may be in need of support and/or referral.			
Other Needs (which may include student health and food services)	Our school does not have a lunch program; as a charter, students bring their own lunches. We provide a sack lunch for those students who do not have one. Office staff does daily temperature checks and monitors student illness. Parents are notified so arrangements can be made for medical attention if necessary. Parents are encouraged not to send students to school if they are ill. We do not have a school nurse. In case of emergency, the local paramedics are called and respond within 5 min.			
Staff Needs:				
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	Staff receives annual PD on an SEL topic including suicide prevention training. Conversations and referral are provided through the school director.
